Scottish Naming, Patterns

Many Scottish families followed a standard pattern when naming their children. This allows a genealogist to use informed guesswork when trying to piece together the ancestral puzzle.

First son - named after child's paternal grandfather
Second son - named after child's maternal grandfather

Third son - named after child's father

Subsequent sons - named after uncles, cousins, or whomever

First daughter - named after child's maternal grandmother
Second daughter - named after child's paternal grandmother
Third daughter - named after child's mother

Subsequent daughters - named after aunts, cousins, or whomever
